Nepal PM Oli leaves for China to attend SCO Summit, meet Xi

KATHMANDU, Aug 30: Nepal Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli on Saturday embarked on an official visit to China, where he will attend the SCO summit and meet Chinese President Xi

He is paying a visit from August 30 to September 3 at the invitation of President

During the visit, he will attend the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Summit and the commemoration of the "80th anniversary of the Victory of the Chinese People's War of Resistance Against Japanese Aggression and the World Anti-Fascist War".

Oli will meet President Xi in Tianjin and also address the SCO Plus Summit on Sunday.

He is scheduled to meet other world leaders including Russian President Vladimir Putin on the sidelines of the summit.

Nepal's political circle has urged Oli to raise the issue of the recent agreement be-



tween New Delhi and Beijing to resume trade through Lipulekh pass. Nepal claims Lipulekh as its own territory, a claim that India has categorically rejected as "neither justified nor based on historical facts and evidence".

Earlier in the day, Mayor of Kathmandu Metropolitan City Balendra Shah extended his best wishes to Oli

for the China visit and urged him to take up the issue with China.

While addressing the House of Representatives on Friday, Oli did not say if he would raise the matter with China, but later told reporters he would certainly do so with Chinese leaders.

Oli is being accompanied by his spouse Radhika includes Minister for Science and Education Raghuji Pant, Minister for Tourism and Culture Badri Pandey and other high-ranking government officials.

He will return to Kathmandu on September 3.

Oli is also scheduled to visit India, tentatively two weeks after his trip to China.

8 Opposition-Ruled States Extend Support To Cut In Number Of GST Rate Slabs: Cong's Ramesh

Eight opposition-ruled states have extended their support to a reduction in the number of GST rate slabs and a cut in the rates for mass consumption items, Congress leader Jairam Ramesh said on Saturday.

At the same time, they have demanded a mechanism to ensure the benefits of the rate cuts get passed on to consumers, he said.

According to Ramesh, the eight opposition-ruled states have also demanded compensation to all states for a period of five years, with 2024-25 as the base year, since their revenues are bound to be adversely impacted by the rate cuts.

They have demanded additional levies on 'sin' and luxury goods over and above the proposed 40 per cent be fully transferred to states, he

stressed that these demands are perfectly legitimate and are bolstered by recent papers published by the Union Finance Ministry's own National Institute of Public Finance & Policy (NIPFP).

According to him, the Congress has for long been demanding a GST 2.0 that not only reduces rate slabs and cuts rates but also brings about drastic simplification of procedures and compliance requirements, especially for MSMEs.

Ramesh further said the Congress has also been stressing the essentiality of ensuring that the interests of all states are fully protected.

"It hopes that the GST Council meeting scheduled for next week will not be merely a headline-grabbing exercise so typical of the (Narendra) Modi government, but will also advance the cause of genuine cooperative federalism in letter and spirit," he added. Putin advocates reforms in UN, IMF to reflect modern realities

MOSCOW/BEIJING,

Aug 30: Russian President Vladmir Putin, ahead of the upcoming SCO summit in the Chinese city of Tianjin, lauded Moscow-Beijing ties across all sectors including finance, culture, education, sports, politics, while reiterating both nations continued advocacy for reforms in the UN, and other global entities such as the World Bank and IMF to better reflect modern political realities and ensure broader representation for the developing world.

"Russia and China support reform of the UN so that it fully restores its authority and reflects modern realities. In particular, we advocate for making the Security Council



more democratic by including states from Asia, Africa, and Latin America." Putin said in a handwritten interview to the Chinese media agency Xinhua, one day ahead of his visit to the

county, reports state media TASS. "Alongside our Chinese partners, we support the reform of the International Monetary Fund and

the World Bank," he added.

"It is essential to end the

use of finance as an instrument of neo-colonialism, which runs counter to the interests of the Global Majority. On the contrary, we seek progress for the benefit of all humanity," the Russian leader stressed.

Putin also noted close cooperation between Moscow and Beijing within the G20, BRICS and APEC.

Commenting on bilateral trade, he noted that the mutual trade in the Yuan and Ruble, had left the Euro and the USD as more of a statistical discrepancy than anything else, while confirming a joint initiative to launch a major gas route in 2027 under the moniker of Far East-

"He told me about her, I said, 'oh my gosh, how come I didn't know about her? I thought it was a fascinating idea. He sent me all the research material. As I was going through it and listening to her songs, I started thinking about the character," Razdan told PTI in an inter-

Raj Begum began her musical journey singing at weddings before emerging as one of Kashmir's most powerful female voices. With her father's encouragement, she joined Radio Kashmir in 1954, where her soaring, melodious voice made her a defining presence until her retirement in 1986.

Celebrated for singing straight from the heart, she

In recognition of her contribution, she received the Padma Shri in 2002, the State Award from the Jammu and Kashmir government in 2009, and the Sangeet Natak Akademi Award in 2013. She passed away in 2016 at the age of 89.

Razdan believes that Raj Begum was not just a singer but a pioneer whose resilience and dedication opened doors for women in Kashmir's cultural land-

"The fact that she did what she did at a time when nobody was helping her and all the odds were against her... She fought for that. She realised during the course of her journey that things were much bigger than just her-

"She was paving the way, opening doors for generations to come. I think she must have been so aware of the responsibility she carried — that's the kind of person she was. She was a very farsighted person. That was her whole life." Instead of getting

sibility of playing a renowned figure, the veteran actor said she immersed herself in the songs and the emotions of the character and trusted the

"I just left it to fate. I don't really overthink it at all. I relied on Danish a lot and I think the whole atmosphere around shooting in Kashmir on the locations, everybody in the crew was Kashmiri. So, it just helped to kind of give us that support system that you need as an artist doing something like this.

"Of course, it is a big responsibility but you can't think about that when you're doing your work. You just think of what you have to do and the scene and the emotions and all those things. obvious drama. But there's always the unobvious drama, which plays out in people's lives. People just live their lives as they always do. And I think that always gets ne-

"Even if you see films on World War II. There are very few films like 'The Book Thief', where it was about a little girl wanting to read when books were being burnt in a small town. The thing is that these are stories, which we don't see, need to be told. So hopefully more of them and Danish is going to start the trend now." Razdan said the support Raj Begum received from men, including her father and mentors, breaks stereotypes and shows how they helped her overcome barriers.

"Especially for a place like Kashmir, where you think that men are going to be very patriarchal, society is regressive, and God knows wha else.

I think it breaks those stereotypes, for sure. And tells us a true story of how, actually, men can be very supportive, especially when so many odds are stacked against a woman," she said.

Jagdeep Dhankhar Applies For Pension As Former MLA In Rajasthan

JAIPUR, AUG 30: Former vice-president of India Jagdeep Dhankhar has applied for pension as a former legislator in Rajasthan, offi-

cials said. Dhankhar, who represented the Kishangarh Assembly constituency as a Congress MLA from 1993 to 1998, received pension as a former legislator until July 2019. It was discontinued after he was appointed the governor of West Bengal.

With his tenure as the vicepresident ending following his resignation citing "health

The secretariat has initiated the process, and the pension will be applicable from the date his resignation as the vice-president was accepted, they said. The pension for a former

BJP, RSS, EC indulging in 'vote chori' in India, alleges Rahul Gandhi

ARA (BIHAR), AUG 30: Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Saturday slammed the NDA government at the Centre for the ongoing special intensive revision of electoral rolls in Bihar, and accused the BJP, the RSS and the Election Commission of indulging in 'vote chori'

Addressing a public rally during the Congress' 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' in Ara, the district headquarters of Bhojpur, Gandhi claimed that the electoral roll revision was an "attack on the Constitution and the democratic system of the coun-

"The BJP, the RSS and the EC are indulging in 'vote chori' (stealing of votes) in the country," he alleged.

The 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' that started from Bihar will become a "country-wide movement against stealing of votes of people", he said.

"The NDA government succeeded in stealing votes in Maharashtra and other



parts of the country. But we will not allow the BJP and the EC to steal even a single vote in Bihar," Gandhi, the leader of the opposition in the Lok Sabha, claimed.

"Voting is the right of Dalits, minorities and women, but the Narendra Modi government steals votes to win polls," he alleged. The right to vote has been guaranteed by the Constitution of India, he said.

Holding a copy of the Constitution in his hand, he accused the BJP of "attacking it by stripping people of their right to "We will not allow the BJP to further

steal votes in any other parts of the country. Now, people have started calling BJP leaders 'vote chor' (Vote thieves)," Gandhi
